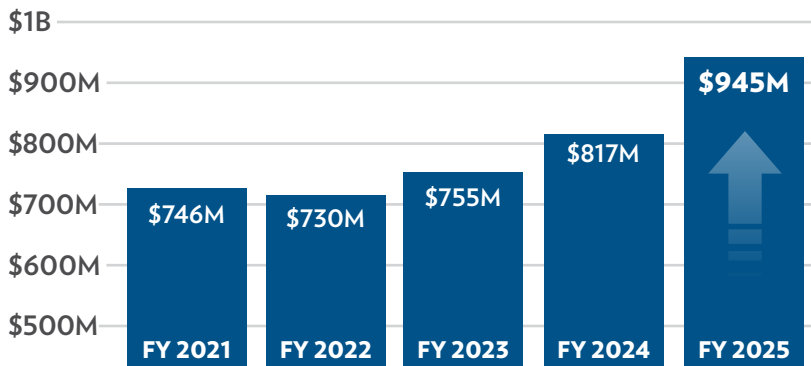

## FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

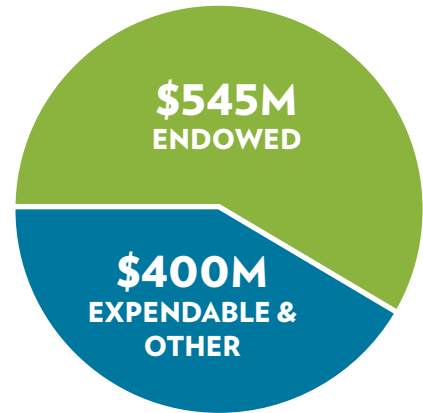
This report reflects the MUSC Foundation's performance and standing at the close of fiscal year 2025, which began July 1, 2024, and ended June 30, 2025.



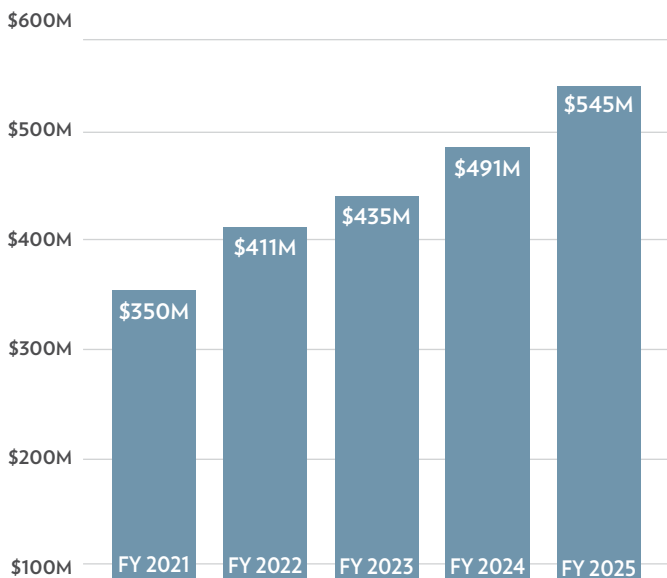
### ASSET VALUE



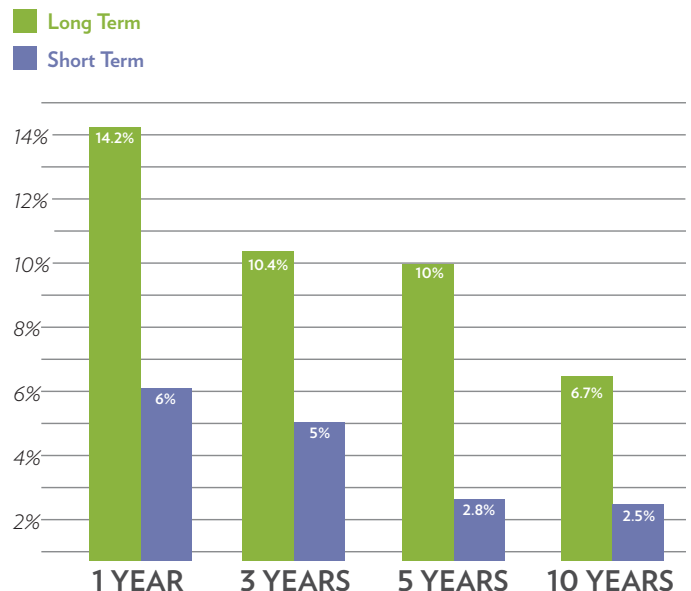
### 2025 FOUNDATION ASSETS



### ENDOWMENT VALUE

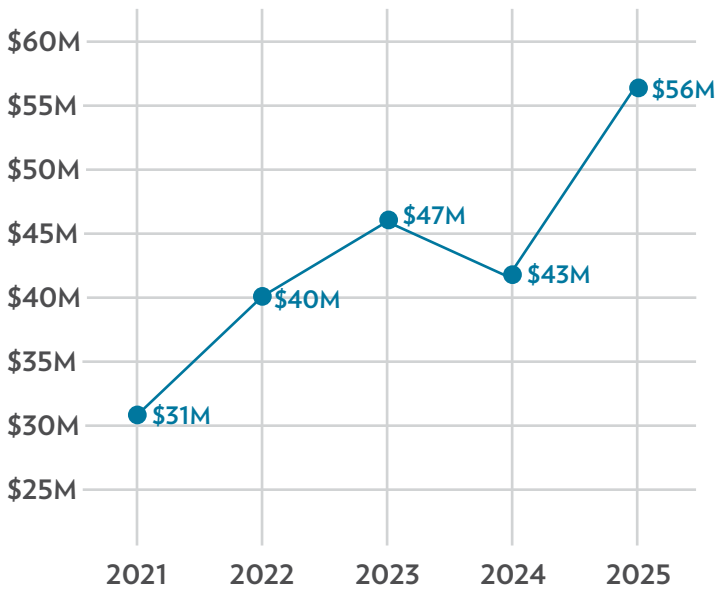

Beyond providing student scholarships, donations also support unique learning opportunities that add great depth and meaning to our students' educational experience.

The CARES (community aid, relief, education and support) Medical Clinic is a great example.

Supported by donations and grants, the clinic provides much-needed care to people who don't have health insurance and might otherwise have to go without. This care is provided three times a week by first- and second-year medical students, working under the guidance and medical supervision of volunteer licensed health care providers.

# RESEARCH

Ava Wease underwent a successful bone marrow transplant to treat leukemia, despite only being able to find a “half match” for compatible bone marrow.

MUSC helped design and participate in the pivotal pediatric clinical trial with haplo-identical donors from 2015-2017 that made Ava’s transplant possible.

Thanks to advances like these, the five-year survival rate for children in the U.S. with cancer is now about 85%, a huge leap from about 58% in the mid-1970s.

Research supported by donors like you is creating new hope for patients living with cancer, heart disease and many other illnesses.

# PATIENT CARE

South Carolina will soon have a powerful new stroke-care resource, thanks to gifts that will help MUSC build a special emergency unit designed specifically for the treatment of stroke patients.

Called the BAT (Brain Attack Team) Cave, this unit will be fully equipped and staffed for rapid stroke care, with neurologists, neurosurgeons, neuro-specific nurses, radiologists, thrombolysis/thrombectomy capabilities and more.

Patients will no longer have to be transported from radiology to treatment rooms. When they arrive at the BAT Cave, the care team will encircle them in the trauma bay, fully empowered with all the equipment and resources needed to provide end-to-end assessment and care in one location, as safely and rapidly as possible.

This consolidation of care could cut treatment time in half, said Christine Holmstedt, D.O., medical director of the MUSC Stroke and Telestroke programs. “It’s huge,” she said. “Very few centers are doing this. The ones that are have had incredible results.”
